Elsebeth Jørgensen, visual artist, works conceptually and site-related with photography, video, sound and installation. Her projects are based on long-term research in historical archives and have circled different ideas of documentation of place, history and montage-based storytelling. Her interest is to observe the potential for poetic narratives within archives, and the inaccessible parts of collections: the not yet registered material as well as archives' own meta-archive material. Her works are spatial montages of various media in which the artist's own documentation and collected archival materials are brought together and digitally processed as multi-layered narratives. In Elsebeth Jørgensen's works fact is mixed with fiction questioning how historical information may just as well be a hypothetical pondering of our notion of the future. As an artist she works with archival spaces with a curiosity for how processes in archives and the construction of collective memory not only imply ambivalence in relation to selection and preservation, but also aesthetic dilemmas in relation to image production and the subjective gaze.

After her education at The Royal Danish Academy of Fine Arts (2002) Elsebeth Jørgensen has exhibited in several group shows.

Part of her practice is realised through developing works for extended art spaces, like the project "Unofficial Deposited Records", Tate Modern, London and her latest commission work "Langs Stien..." / www.langsstien.dk

Merete Ahnfeldt-Mollerup is associate professor at the Royal Danish Academy of Fine Arts, School of Architecture and programme coordinator for the International Master's Programme in Architectural Design at the school. After some years in her own architectural practice, MAM wrote a PhD dissertation about the work of Mies van der Rohe as seen in the context of the radical art of the 1920's. While working on her PhD, MAM was a visiting scholar at Columbia University in the City of New York.

Currently, MAM's field of research and development is perception – how one's perception of space influences one's well-being and quality of life, and how architects can work consciously with the perception of space during the design process.

Lise Skytte Jakobsen holds a PhD degree in Art History and she is a Postdoctoral Fellow with the Department of Aesthetics and Communication at Aarhus University. Her doctoral thesis (2011) was on "Metasculpture: Critical analyses of fundamental problems regarding the medium of sculpture". In her post-doc project (2013-2016) she investigates the aesthetics of 3D-printing: How do artists, architects and designers use 3D prints and how does this new mass medium influence the way we consider 'things'?

In the Studio Constructing an Archive, which is part of the master's degree programme at the Aarhus School of Architecture, we focus on the study of architectural representation and how a critical approach to architectural representation can inform the making and thinking of architecture.
